from Church Council...

Church council meetings lately have had some incredible mission-focused, life-giving, and crucial conversations! Here are some recent discussions...

We often discuss 'our church' but what does *our community* need?

Safe spaces to gather. Shelter (like with family promise).

Dinners. Food. "We all need food in our bellies, God in our hearts, and to be loved."

Signs of hope and light (like a lighthouse) Holy space for worship.

Connection, friendship, and support--especially for senior adults and families/parents

Cleanups in the neighborhood and park.

Love and acceptance (new ways of outreach)

"Sometimes getting TO the church is the hardest part. We need church to come to us."

How can we have difficult conversations in loving ways?

Pastor Emily sent a church-wide email at the end of the summer--sharing that church council would be discussing ways for the WHOLE church to be better informed and faithfully discuss denominational legislation called "The Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace through Separation." This legislation won't come before the global General Conference until August of 2022 (and if it does pass, churches will have until *at least* August of 2023 should they decide to react). Church council's unanimous decision was that the first step is to seek information from our conference leadership. Our bishop's assistant, Rev. Alex Shanks, is currently working to schedule a presentation for us at RPUMC and we will share that date with everyone AS SOON as we know it. In the meantime, church council agreed on some healthy and faithful guidelines for HOW we want this conversation to unfold in healthy ways:

As the body of Christ, we want to AVOID...

- politicizing. hurt.
- bitterness. angst. nastiness.
- confusion and/or gossip.
- rushing and/or procrastinating
- secrecy/hiddenness
- damaging our Christian witness (i.e. are we acting like people who love Jesus?)
- distraction/stepping away from our purpose
- exclusion or pressure to "pick sides"
- an empty crumbling building that outlasts the people who are the body
- separating community/congregation (we are also part of the community and "the community" is also in our church)

As the body of Christ, we want to WORK FOR...

- continued love for one another (even with our disagreements and differences)
- understanding. information. (i.e. contacting the UMC conference leadership for clarity)
- deeper spiritual growth and connection to scripture
- Worship and community and mission to be at the front.
 We have to be in the present and respond to the needs around us.
- to seek understanding rather than trying to change one another
- Worship together. We worship well at this church, so this conversation should be connected to our connection to God: with communion and forgiveness.
- Scripture. Scripture. Scripture.
- Conversations and incarnational connection. "We need to ask questions. Have eye contact. See PEOPLE."



The purpose of charge conference is "to review and evaluate the total mission and ministry of the church, receive reports, and adopt objectives and goals recommended by the church council that are in keeping with the objectives of The United Methodist Church."

We will gather online with several neighboring United Methodist Churches (Avondale, Ebenezer, Garden City, Highlands, Murray Hill, New Life Community, Simpson Memorial and Wesley Fellowship)--sharing ministry celebrations and challenges.


RPUMC's Gallery Project: "Articles of Faith" Meet Ron Richardson of Testament Photography.

Since the pandemic has made it challenging for some to make it to church and view our first art installation, "Articles of Faith," in the McCord Building, we decided to bring the photographs to you a few images at a time along with some information about each one!

Ron Richardson, the visual artist responsible for the installation, explores the next five photos in the display. Consider these both as a group and as individual images. Collectively, they all deal with construction, both complex and simple, plain, and greatly detailed. They are geographically diverse, coming from France, Georgia, and New Mexico and feature Catholic and Baptist

denominations. As you examine these as a group, what common threads do you see? The first individual image I'll discuss with you is this crucifix. It is suspended on an outside wall near the doorway of a small church in rural New Mexico. Protected from the elements by a small overhang, the crucifix was crafted by one of the parishioners. If you look closely at the image, you will notice a section of a cutter bar from a tractor powered mower has been used to frame the crucifix. Further examination will show that, while the carving is crude, the artist has included some great details; the blood from Christ's wounds and a scraped knee incurred when he stumbled while carrying the cross. The addition of the rope around His waist was an interesting addition as is the tassel, even though it is way out of proportion to the rest of the carving. The final element I want you to see is where the artist exercised artistic license and painted the thorn tips and nail heads turquoise. Of all the religious artifacts I've seen on my travels, this is a favorite. I can almost see the artist creating it as a labor of love.






The second photo, which is about as far away stylistically from the crucifix as it is in terms of distance, is this panel from the exterior of Cathedral Notre Dame de Paris, which illustrates the final judgment. This central portal was completed around 1220. Arranged in rows around the outside are the saints and angels who are watching. Notice that while the characters are similar, each is different from the other. God is on the judgment seat. Below Him is an angel holding a scale tipping in favor of the just. To the left of the angel are the sheep, to the right are demons charged with leading the goats away. Take a moment to compare the expressions of the individuals in the respective groups.

San Rafael church is located near the small community of La Cueva, New Mexico and was built from 1862-1870. Designed by the local French priest, the church features Gothic-type windows, doors, and high ceilings. These features and the use of rafters in the roof were unheard of in the area. San Rafael served the area until 1952 when it was abandoned. Over the next 38 years San Rafael church was ravaged by the elements but underwent a restoration starting in 1990 that culminated in its rededication in 1996. I was drawn to its unique design, select use of color, and the shade of adobe that just pops against the beautiful New Mexico sky.



White Plains Baptist Church was organized in Greene County, GA in 1806, and pre-dates the town of the same name, which was incorporated many years later, in 1834. According to church records, there have been four buildings on this same site with




The final image in this group is another from the Cathedral Notre Dame de Paris. It features.


six of the 12 apostles. In this one, pay particular attention to the items each apostle carries. Also, notice the men underneath the pedestals occupied by the apostles. If you look at the bottom left and bottom right of the photo, you will see a bull and a lion, the symbols for Luke and Mark respectively.
